**Course Description**

The codes and standards governing the profession of psychology require that psychologists undertake professional activities for which we are competent by way of education, training, and experience (Canadian Psychological Association, 2000). For example, the College of Alberta Psychologists (2010) defines competence as "knowledge, skills, judgment and diligence." The Canadian Psychological Association recognizes that "supervision is a specialized area of psychological activity that has its own foundation of knowledge and skills that are enhanced by education and training (Canadian Psychological Association, 2017, p. 4). This course provides an overview of the *knowledge* component of competence in the specialization of supervision in professional psychology, and provides a foundation for the future development of applied skills in this area. The course is intended primarily for psychologists, as well as those with graduate degrees in other mental health disciplines (e.g., clinical social work, counselling therapy, marriage and family therapy) in Canada, who wish to increase their competency in the provision of clinical supervision to students, interns and early career practitioners. The course addresses: (a) supervision competencies; (b) models and approaches to supervision; (c) administrative, organizational, and evaluative aspects of providing supervision; and (e) relational and ethical dimensions of supervision.

**Course Fee:** \$1,212 Members of the Psychologists' Association of Alberta (PAA) are eligible for a rebate of \$175.00 from the PAA, upon presentation of proof of completion within six weeks of course.

**Prerequisites:**

- Registered Psychologists (including Registered Provisional Psychologists, and those with similar status)

- Others with a minimum of a master's degree in a mental health profession, with the permission of the Chair and/or instructor.

You are expected to contribute reflections and personal experiences that promote discussion and understanding of the course concepts.
